ATTENTION FRENCHMEN! At a meeting of the City Council of Columbus, on November 22, 1842, the following resolutions in relation to the Fire Department were adopted:

Resolved, That there be paid out of moneys appropriated by the Columbus Insurance Company for the benefit of the Fire Department, the following premium, to wit: To the Brigade which shall first throw water on any fire occurring in this city, the sum of \$2; if the fire occurs within one square of their Engine House—the sum of \$12; if the fire occurs within two squares—the sum of \$15; if the fire occurs within three squares—the sum of \$18; if within four squares—the sum of \$21; if within five squares—and continues for the space of each additional square that the fire may be from the Engine House; the squares to reckon from street to street; the money thus appropriated to be equally divided between the three companies forming the brigade which shall enter on the premium.

Resolved, That if the first engine which arrives at any fire shall arrive on the ground at any fire with their apparatus before the arrival of any Engine or Hose Company, they shall be paid out of the above named fund, the sum of three dollars. On motion of the Council, the following resolutions be published in the Journal and Statesman of this city.
