Some account of Margaret Lyal, or the Sleeping Girl of Montrose, whose case appears to have been a remarkable one of Carus. Communicated from observation, By Mr JAMES ARROT, Fellow of the Royal College of Surgeons, Edinburgh.

MARGARET LYAL, ætat 19, who had hitherto enjoyed good health, left the service of Mr Arkley of Dunninald, on the 26th of May, and on Saturday the 27th went home to Mrs Foote of Logie-Park, in the vicinity of Montrose. On the 31st, the Wednesday following, she was attacked with a nervous fever, that confined her seventeen days, the first ten of which was at Mrs Foote's, and the remainder at her father's, a shoemaker,
