On this 30th day of July 1848 personally appeared before me James M. White J.S.C. Edith Tally a resident of Newton County Georgia, aged seventy eight years the 3^d day of March last, who being duly sworn according to Law, doth on her oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the act 29th July 1848. That she is the widow of Henry Tally who was a soldier in the Revolution and a Pensioner, at the rate of sixty dollars per annum. Act 7th June 1832 State of Georgia, all of which will fully appear by reference to the papers on file in the Pension Office. She further declares that she was married to the said Henry Tally in York District South Carolina by Hugh White a Magistrate on the first day of December seventeen hundred and ninety five, that her husband the aforesaid Henry Tally died on the 4th day of June 1836, that she was not married to him prior to his leaving the service, but the marriage took place previous to the second day of January 1800, viz at the time above stated and that there is no public or private record of her marriage; she further swears that she is now a widow and that she has never before made any application for a Pension. That on the 10th day of August 1837, she married Francis Hopkins and lived with him about five months when they separated he having disposed of her property contrary to a marriage settlement, and otherwise ill treated her; but she will forbear details and state that the Superior Court of Newton County Georgia granted a Divorc a vinculo matrimonii from the said Hopkins (a copy of which proceedings are herewith filed) which restores her to her rights as the widow of Henry Tally - and she further declares that she is now a widow and has not intermarried with any one since the death of the said Henry Tally except the said Francis Hopkins. She hereby appoints S. H. McCutchen, attorney at Law of Washington City D.C. to prosecute her claim to a pension, and that she has no record of her age.

That they are aged J. S. Baker 59 years Francis M. Wether 69 years and are residents of Newton County
